Pearl Wade Roberts was born to Walter Reed Jewett and Emily 'Emma' Roberts¹ Jewett on March 5, 1886 in Arlington, Iowa. Pearl spent a happy and active childhood growing up in Arlington. She graduated from Arlington High School and later attended upper Iowa of Fayette. On December 25th, 1905, pearl married Harrison 'Harry' Wade. To this union, three daughters were born: Ruth Wade (later Yenney of Janesville, WI), Lillian Wade (later Prichett of Rockford, IL) and M. Fay "Aunt Babe" Wade (later Gaynor of Hinsdale, MT).



Pearl Roberts was a spiritual and exceptionally active woman. She participated in scores of local social affairs/functions, worked as a bookkeeper for Interstate Power Company in Arlington, and was deeply devoted to her church and faith. As history moved into the Great Depression, in 1929 Pearl lost her father

Walter a heart attack and then – in January of the following year - her mother Emma passed away. Still, Pearl remained positive and active in the community and devoted her time to friends, family, religion and supporting local causes.

In time, Pearl (invited by her husband Harry) became a member of the Arlington Masons & Eastern Stars - Aldebaran Chapter OES No. 259; the WSCS (Women's Society of Christian Service; particularly within the Esther and Naomi Circles); the Pastime Embroidery Club, and many more area groups. On October 14<sup>th</sup>, 1945, Harry Wade passed away, but Pearl re-married again in 1952, this time to another 'Harry' –

Harrison Roberts. Sadly, Harry Roberts would only live until 1956. The following year, she fell on the front porch of her home and fractured her shoulder. Pearl was 71 years old at the time.

Understandably concerned over her welfare, Pearl's family (and particularly her daughter Ruth Yenney of Janesville, WI) urge her to move to Janesville, which she agrees to in late 1957. In Arlington, farewell parties are held and sincere, sad and heartfelt goodbyes are offered by friends and family. The 'permanent' move doesn't take however, as Pearl returns home to Arlington in April of 1958. She picks up right where she left off with her clubs

and activities, broken up with occasional (and even winter long) visits home to her daughters. In 1960 however, the family once again convinces Pearl to move to Janesville and this time it takes. Pearl sells her home in Arlington and takes up residence with her daughter Ruth. At 74 years old(!), she goes to work as a bookkeeper for the J. M. Bostwick Store in Janesville and in a short time is even promoted to head bookkeeper.

Pearl continues travel back and forth to Arlington (this time, escorted by daughters) to see old friends, but as she nears 80 years, her health understandably begins decline. Around 1970. Pearl is admitted the Homestead Convalescent Center in Janesville. She dies on August 30, 1976, at the age of 90. She is survived by her 3 daughters, 3 grand-14 children, great grand-children, and one great, great, granddaughter. She preceded in death by her parents, husbands, and 4 sisters. She is buried at the Taylorsville Cemetery.
