Simon Sullivan Saucerman Senior 1845-1916


A biography prepared by Stephen S. Saucerman 3-14-2019

Simon Saucerman (Senior) was born in [Coshocton County](#), Ohio June 25, 1845. He was brought to Green County, WI in his infancy and grew to maturity on the home farm in Cadiz Township, where he received a fair education in the rural school districts. Upon the breaking out of the civil war, when scarcely 18 years old and with a spirit that actuated so many loyal men throughout the north at that time, he volunteered into the services of this country to battle for the main its of its rights. On December 22, 1863 he enlisted in company H, 16th Wisconsin Infantry under which he rendered valuable service until mustered out in July 12, 1865.

During his military service he shared with his comrades the fortunes and vicissitudes of war in many bloody fields notable among which were the battles of [Kennesaw Mountain](#), [Lovejoy Station](#), [Higget's Hill](#), [Jonesboro](#), and other engagements in

the Atlanta campaign. Later his command took part in the pursuit of the confederate forces under Hood in Georgia and with Sherman in his celebrated march to the sea, participating in the actions of Pocotaligo, Orangeburg, Columbus, SC, Bentonville, NC and the surrender of [General Joseph E. Johnson](#) at Raleigh in the latter state. Proceeding northward at the secession of hostilities he took part in the grand view at the National Capital, after which he received an honorable discharge and return to home in the Green County.

On quitting the army, Mr. SAUCERMAN located near the old homestead where he lived one year, then took up residence in Monroe where – in the five years ensuing - gave his attention to real estate into which he did considerable business in the quarrying and handling of granite. In October 1872, he disposed of his



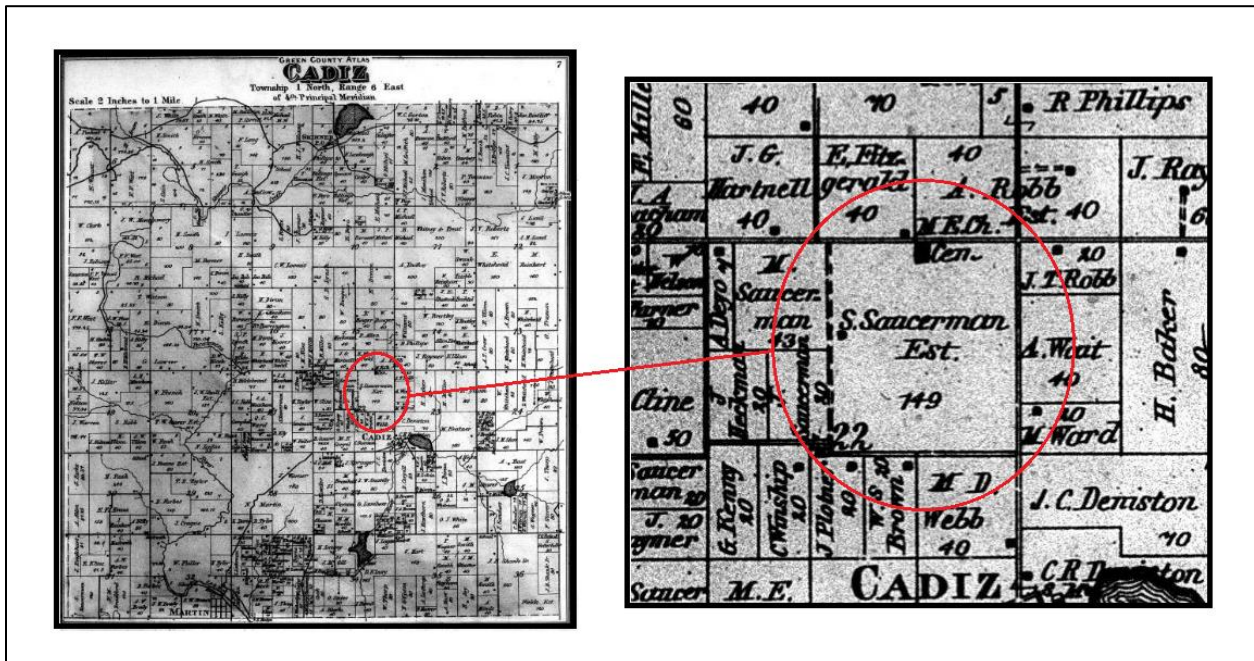

interest in the city and moved back to a farm which he'd purchased in Cadiz Township where he engaged in agricultural pursuits until 1885, when he again returned to Monroe for the purpose of providing his children with better educational advantages than the rural districts offered.

After a residence of eight years in the city (Monroe), he moved back to the farm in 1892 and once again engaged in agriculture and the raising of stock. Active in social life, Simon Saucerman Senior was a man of affairs and kept abreast at all times of all matters of public interest. He was a stockholder in the Commercial Bank of Monroe, a member of O. F. Pinney Post C.A.R., and for many years affiliated with Smith Lodge Number 31, A.F. & A.M. of Monroe, and the Commandery at Freeport.

On July 4, 1866, Mr. Saucerman was united in marriage to Miss Sarah E Crago (*sometimes seen as 'Craigo' in my research) whose father Fordyco Crago, came to Green County from Pennsylvania in 1845, settling in Cadiz Township. Of this union three children were born, the oldest Atty. Willard T. Saucerman of this city, Minnie L. who married August Neusus, a farmer in Stephenson County, Il, and Charles H., who passed away Feb. 3, 1912.

Mr. Saucerman is also survived by his second wife, Mrs. Belle Wells, Mrs. Belle Wells [*NOTE: although another obituary said the lady he married on this same date was a '**Ruth Noble**'; not sure which is correct], to whom he was united in marriage on December 23, 1914. He also has 3 grandchildren, Marjorie (daughter of Charles Saucerman, who would later in 1933 contest SSS Sr's will), Simon & Willard H. He also

leaves one brother, Dr. John W SAUCERMAN of Winslow Illinois.

REGARDING HIS DEATH: The death summons came suddenly to Mr. SAUCERMAN about 7:00 Friday evening (the day after Thanksgiving). He had been a man apparently in rugged health in spite of this year's and a man who was to be seen daily about business section. On awakening yesterday morning Mr. SAUCERMAN complained to his wife that he was not feeling in his usual health and announced his intention of remaining in bed longer than was his usual custom, but it was believed by his family that his

illness was a temporary nature and no alarm was felt over the same. He died later in the day. "Paralysis was the immediate cause of dissolution (death)".
